Consider: Do children know where they live in the world? Do they know the name of the planet they are on, the continent they live on, the country they are in, their county, their city, their street name? Look at maps – how does the size of the UK compare to other countries? Consider if all the places in the world had no name – what would that mean? Geographical skills: Locational knowledge	Consider: Teaching the names of the continents through songs and rhymes. Locate them on a map of the world. Can they identify the names of the continents? Consider using bee-bots to control them to visit given continents to ensure chn understand their place in the world. Consider: Children should share their learning about the continents and oceans. Where in the world would you most like to visit and why? Geographical skills: Place knowledge	Making connections across subjects Where in the world would you most like to visit? English: Children write a persuasive letter to their parents about the continent they would like to visit most, based on its human and physical features. English: Children imagine that they have visited their favourite continent. Write a postcard from their visit – what did they see, hear, eat? Art: Children could draw pictures of features of the continent they would most like to visit. Provision: Children use travel brochures to collage the continent they would most like to visit. PSHE: Learn famous children's games from different continents. Which one do they enjoy playing the most?
